

FORUM

At our membership meeting in January our members heard from Liz McGriff of the Rochester City-Wide Tenant Union about their campaign for Rent Stabilization and Good Cause Eviction Protections. Our members had a opportunity to ask questions and then we overwhelmingly voted to endorse the Rest Stabilization & Emergency Tenant Protection Act.

In May the City approved funding for a Vacancy Study to determine how many units in the city would be impacted by rent stabilization. An earlier study commissioned in 2021 was seen by many to be invalid after it found there were too many vacant units in Rochester, and just 37% of landlords actually participated in the study. Now landlords are required to participate in the study or be subject to fines.

In June the City voted to opt into Good Cause Eviction, which would protect tenants against unjust evictions. The City is hosting upcoming forums for more input as groups call for greater protections. Once example is the current LLC Loophole — a carve-out that exempts tenants living under some landlords from Good Cause, and leaves all tenants in the dark about whether we're protected due to New York's lack of LLC transparency.

NO - this does not mean a tenant can NEVER be evicted!

What are "Good Causes" for eviction under this bill?

- ~ Nonpayment of rent ~ Lease violation ~ Causing a nuisance or objectionable conduct
- Use of property for an illegal purpose Damaging the unit
- ~ Refusing the landlord access to the unit for the purpose of making repairs or for showing the property to a prospective purchaser ^ Landlord seeking to recover possession of the premises for personal use
- ~ If the unit has been legally sublet, the subletter can recover possession for their primary residence
- ~ The Department of Neighborhood and Business Development can issue an order requiring the tenant to vacate the property



<u>CWA President Cummings and IUE-CWA President Kennebrew Invited to</u> <u>Serve on Labor Advisory Committee</u>

Last month, Acting Labor Secretary Julie Su and U.S. Trade Representative Katherine Tai (USTR) invited CWA President Claude Cummings Jr. and IUE-CWA Division President Carl Kennebrew to serve on the Labor Advisory Committee for Trade Negotiations and Trade Policy. In this role, President Cummings and President Kennebrew will be able to review draft texts of U.S. trade negotiations, enabling them to provide feedback on behalf of our union to make sure that our trade policies support good union jobs for CWA members and other workers across the country.

In recent decades, a large majority of the advisers that the USTR has appointed to review trade negotiating texts have served on behalf of corporations, many of whom stand to profit by offshoring our jobs to lower-wage countries where they can exploit workers. With CWA and IUE-CWA represented, the Biden Administration has once again shown its respect for the views of working people by welcoming us to have a seat at the table to protect workers' interests.

CWA Director of Government Affairs Dan Mauer took a literal seat at the table when he testified last week at a roundtable hosted by Democratic members of the House of Representatives Select Committee on the Chinese Communist Party. Mauer spoke in support of the Biden-Harris Administration's recent actions to combat the illegal dumping of goods by Chinese government-controlled companies that displaces American manufacturing jobs.







This Week in Labor History

August 8, 1902

Delegates to the St. Paul Trades and Labor Assembly elect 35-year-old Charles James, leader of the Boot and Shoe Workers local union, as their president. He was the first African-American elected to that leadership post in St. Paul and, many believe, the first anywhere in the nation.



August 7, 2011

45,000 Verizon workers represented by the Communications Workers of America and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers begin a 2-week strike over management's refusal to engage in serious bargaining. The two unions condemned the company's push for large-scale concessions, given Verizon's \$22 billion profitability over the past four years.



<u>August 5, 1993</u>

The Family and Medical Leave Act goes into effect, providing employees up to twelve weeks of unpaid, job-protected leave per year for family and medical reasons. FMLA applies to all public agencies, all public and private elementary and secondary schools, and companies with 50 or more employees.
